



Best Online Teaching and Learning Practices

Online teaching and learning is a shared commitment between faculty and students to fully participate in creative explorations and discussions. It requires all participants to be present, prepared, and ready to engage. A collective dedication to producing quality work and safe learning environments helps ensure meaningful online teaching and learning experiences.

- 1. Students and faculty are **aware of lighting**, **sound**, **and background** items in the room.
- It is necessary for the class community to establish a way in which participants will share and discuss concepts – such as raise hand or colored cards, or the chat with a monitor that rotates.
- 3. Mute sound unless you wish to talk.
- 4. **The cohort model works well for specific courses/degree programs.** The cohort model enables students to know each other and progress together. The cohort model creates a community of shared interest and community of practice. Research shows that faculty and students do best when they know each other.
- 5. Focus on 'Active' Learning. Let your course include discussion, peer-to-peer collaboration, video and audio clips, hands-on exercises with text, and brief video lectures (10-15 minute chunks).
- 6. **Clear assignments and deadlines are essential.** Straight-forward communication of what is expected and the timelines for completion are important.
- 7. **Students and faculty respond thoughtfully, and effectively.** Thoughtful personal responses have a positive effect. They humanize the online learning experience for both the faculty and the students.
- 8. Multiple means of engagement enhance the connection of the learner to the course objectives and facilitate the learning experience. To do this, leverage a variety of available tools, including typed responses, VoiceThread, Video Clips of Creative Process, Adobe
- 9. Easy access to faculty and other classmates make a big difference. The faculty-student and student-student relationship is critical to humanizing the teaching and learning experience in a mixed and online course.
